Policy for curtailing stubble burning

3406. SHRI MOHD. ALI KHAN:

Will the Minister of ENVIRONMENT, FOREST AND CLIMATE CHANGE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that NITI Aayog has advised the Government to frame a policy to stop crop stubble burning by farmers around Delhi to curtail air pollution;
- (b) if so, the details thereof;
- (c) whether Government has allocated any funds for implementation of this plan and the activities planned under the policy; and
- (d) whether States have been advised to frame policies to curtail this stubble burning by farmers to contain air pollution?

- (a) & (b) NITI Aayog in partnership with Confederation of Indian Industry launched an initiative in November 2016 for "Improving the air quality of Delhi-NCR." Under the initiative, a task force for biomass management was constituted. The task force, in its report, has identified various avenues for the alternate usage of paddy straw/crop residue, such as in-situ mulching for increasing the yield; parli char and bio-char for use as soil conditioner and in soil remediation; pellets and briquettes for use in boilers and power plants; BioCNG and Bioethanol as alternative fuel etc.
- (c) & (d) The Government has approved a new Central Sector Scheme on 'Promotion of Agricultural Mechanization for in-situ management of Crop Residue in the States of Punjab, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh and NCT of Delhi for the period from 2018-19 to 2019-20 with an outlay of Rs. 1151.80 crore. The above central sector scheme has been prepared after due consultation with the state governments.
