IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING OF AYUSHMAN BHARAT

2035. SHRI MALLIKARJUN KHARGE:

Will the Minister of **HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE** be pleased to state:

- (a) the number of empanelled hospitals and health and wellness centres per 100,000 population, State-wise;
- (b) the number of vacant posts of community health officers under Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogaya Yojana (AB-PMJAY), State-wise, and the steps taken to fill these vacancies:
- (c) whether Government has conducted any assessment on the impact of upgraded primary health centres and sub-centres on citizens' health, if so, the details thereof; and
- (d) whether Government has resumed the publication of monitoring reports for AB-PMJAY and if not, the reasons thereof?

ANSWER THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH & FAMILY WELFARE (SHRI PRATAPRAO JADHAV)

- (a): State/UT-wise number of hospitals empanelled under AB PM-JAY, as on 01.03.2025, and State/UT-wise number of Ayushman Arogya Mandirs (AAM) (erstwhile Health and Wellness Centres) operationalized, as on 28.02.2025, is enclosed as Annexure-I.
- (b): The number of Community Health Officer (CHO) posts vacant in AAM- Sub-health Centres in rural areas in various States/UTs, as on 28.02.2025, is enclosed as Annexure-II. The National Health Mission (NHM) provides support for improvement in health infrastructure, availability of adequate human resources in health facilities, to improve availability and accessibility to quality healthcare especially for the under-served and marginalized groups in rural areas. The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare provides technical and financial support to the States/UTs to strengthen the public healthcare system, based on the proposals received in the form of Programme Implementation Plans (PIPs) under NHM. The Government of India provides approval for the proposals in the form of Record of Proceedings (RoPs) as per norms and available resources. However, the primary responsibility for engagement/availability of human resources in public health facilities lies with the respective State Government.

- (c): Under NHM, the performance of various health programmes is regularly assessed, through review meetings, mid-term reviews of key deliverables, field visits of senior officials, promoting performance by setting up benchmarks for service delivery & rewarding achievements etc. Various indicators of National Health Mission (NHM) have been regularly assessed through external surveys such as, National Family Health Survey (NFHS) and Sample Registration System (SRS). Further, under NHM, Common Review Missions (CRM) are conducted annually to assess and monitor the progress and implementation status of various schemes.
- (d): The National Health Authority (NHA) has implemented various measures for onground analysis of AB PM-JAY. A Monitoring and Research (M&R) Division, under NHA, continuously tracks the scheme's progress in real time basis. A dashboard with various key performance indicators (KPI) has been designed to constantly monitor the scheme. The performance of the scheme is objectively evaluated in terms of cards issued, number of hospital admissions, quality of treatment provided, timely settlement of claims etc. Constant feedback is provided to the States/UTs with regards to the implementation of AB PM-JAY.
