INCREASE IN EXPORT THROUGH FTAS

530. DR. ASHOK KUMAR MITTAL:

Will the Minister of Commerce and Industry be pleased to state:

- (a) whether Free Trade Agreements (FTAs) signed by India previously have contributed in increasing India's exports, if so, details of such number FTAs, country-wise;
- (b) measures which have been taken by Government to strengthen FTAs to build robust structure of India's trade, if so, key findings and recommendations thereof;
- (c) new FTAs India has negotiated along with negotiations with Oman, Australia, UK, EU and in what manner Government plans to introduce lack of adequate industry and stakeholder consultation during the negotiation process of FTAs; and
- (d) the manner in which Government plans to enhance effectiveness of existing FTAs?

ANSWER

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY (SHRI JITIN PRASADA)

- (a) India has signed 14 Free Trade Agreements (FTAs) and 6 Preferential Trade Agreements (PTAs) with its trading partners. These foreign trade agreements have contributed to increasing India's exports. A list of these FTAs and PTAs along with the corresponding export data is given in Annexure.
- (b) to (d) The negotiations for Free Trade Agreements (FTAs) with Oman, Australia, the United Kingdom, and the European Union are currently ongoing. The Government is taking necessary measures to ensure that stakeholder consultations, including industry representation, are conducted at all stages of the negotiations. This includes the pre-negotiation phase, each round of negotiations, and the post-conclusion phase during the implementation of the agreements.

In addition to this structured approach, sector-specific consultations are also being carried out to address particular issues as they arise. Through these consultations, domestic sensitivities and interests are being carefully considered during the ongoing negotiations. For agreements that have already been concluded, these concerns are being raised with the respective FTA partner countries during periodic reviews, and systematic follow-up is being ensured.
