1821 SMT. PHULO DEVI NETAM:

Will the Minister of Corporate Affairs be pleased to state:

- (a) the amount spent by various industrial units in the State of Chhattisgarh under Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) during the last five years;
- (b) the details of the amount spent, district wise and area wise;
- (c) whether the amount under CSR is spent on the recommendation of MPs; and
- (d) if so, the names of the Members of Parliament and the details of the sanctioned amount that have been used for developmental works in the last five years?

(a) to (d): Under the Companies, 2013, CSR is a Board driven process and the Board of the company is empowered to plan, decide, execute and monitor CSR activities of the company based on the recommendation of its CSR Committee. The Government does not issue any direction on which activity or area, company shall spend. As per the CSR framework companies mandated to incur CSR expenditure are required to file details of CSR activities annually in the MCA21 registry. All data related to CSR expenditure filed by companies in MCA21 registry is available in public domain and can be accessed at www.csr.gov.in. The Government has no information about recommendations received or acted upon by the concerned mandated companies.

On the basis of annual filings made by companies in the MCA21 registry, District-wise and Development Sector- wise CSR expenditure in Chhattisgarh for the last five Financial Years from 2019-20 to FY 2023-24 are attached at Annexure-I and Annexure-II respectively.
