#### TRAINING OF IAS OFFICERS IN MINISTRIES/ DEPARTMENTS

#### 3319. SHRI RYAGA KRISHNAIAH:

Will the **PRIME MINISTER** be pleased to state:

- (a) whether Government provides exposure to newly recruited Indian Administrative Services (IAS) officers in various Ministries and Departments of the Central Government;
- (b) if so, the number of officers who have been provided such exposure so far and the key areas or schemes in which they are trained; and
- (c) the manner in which this exposure is expected to benefit the officers in the effective discharge of their duties in their respective cadres?

### **ANSWER**

# MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF PERSONNEL, PUBLIC GRIEVANCES AND PENSIONS AND MINISTER OF STATE IN THE PRIME MINISTER'S OFFICE (DR. JITENDRA SINGH)

(a) to (c): Yes; the Assistant Secretary Programme for newly recruited IAS officers is a key component of induction training for IAS officers. This programme was conceived with the specific purpose of exposing young IAS officers to the policy-making processes and the structure of governance at the Union level, before they take up administrative roles in the field. The objective of the programme is to acquaint officer trainees with the operational dynamics of the Central Government, instilling in them a national perspective and a deeper appreciation of the policies shaping India's development. The programme reinforces a wholeof-government approach, rooted in the belief that citizen-centric governance and inter-ministerial collaboration are the bedrock of efficient and inclusive administration. From 2023 onwards, the programme has been restructured and aligned more closely with overall induction training and it is now an integral part of the training of IAS officers with a duration of 8 weeks, before the start of Phase II training at LBSNAA. Through hands-on training, exposure to flagship schemes, and close involvement in ministry-level work, the officers gain first-hand experience in governance and policy formulation. A total of 1,580 IAS officers have been given exposure so far under the Assistant Secretary Programme, which commenced in 2015 with IAS officers of the 2013 batch. They are attached as Assistant Secretaries in various Ministries /Department for a duration of eight weeks. Their key responsibilities include working as Desk Officer/Under Secretary with the assigned Ministry/Department. They are assigned some identified problem statements for detailed analysis and solution suggestions. This programme is a key component of the government's capacitybuilding efforts, aiming to orient officers towards national goals, promote a citizen-centric approach, and provide exposure to technological innovations in governance. It helps officers gain a national perspective, appreciate policy diversity, and understand the broader vision of Government of India programmes, preparing them to be effective and inspired administrators in their respective cadres. Also while working as Desk Officer/Under Secretary they become familiar with the working of the Central Secretariat.

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
