PRIVATE GODOWNS

*282. SHRI KAUSHALENDRA KUMAR: SHRI VISHNU DAYAL RAM:

Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS, FOOD AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION उपभोक्ता मामले, खाद्य और सार्वजनिक वितरण मंत्री be pleased to state:

(a) the number and capacity of foodgrains storage godowns both in public and private sectors separately, State-wise;

(b) whether the private godowns are subjected to any regulatory mechanism and if so, the details thereof and if not, the reasons therefor;

(c) whether large scale storage of foodgrains in private godowns is one of the reasons for the abnormal rise in the prices of foodgrains in the market and if so, the response of the Government thereto; and

(d) whether there are incidences of pilferage, theft and wastage of foodgrains reported in the private and Government godowns and if so, the details thereof and the corrective steps taken thereon?

ANSWER

MINISTER OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS, FOOD & PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI RAM VILAS PASWAN)

(a) to (d): A Statement is laid on the Table of the House.

STATEMENT REFERRED TO IN REPLY TO PARTS (a) to (d) OF THE STARRED QUESTION NO.282 DUE FOR ANSWER ON 6th DECEMBER, 2016 IN THE LOK SABHA

(a): As per survey conducted in 2014, the State-wise details of the number and available capacity of storage godowns both in public and private sectors for foodgrains/ agricultural items are enclosed as Annexure-I.

(b): The private godowns are not subjected to any regulatory mechanism. However, those private godown owners who want to issue Negotiable Warehouse Receipts (NWR) need to register their godowns with Warehousing Development & Regulatory Authority (WDRA), which has been constituted in the year 2010. As on 30.11.2016, a total of 1326 warehouses including 699 private warehouses are registered with WDRA. There is no provision in WDRA Act for regulation of those godowns which are not registered with it.

(c): There are multiple factors responsible for price rise such as global inflation, increasing demand, less production, increased cost of transportation, black marketing, black money, increase in money supply, issues in supply chain management etc. However, there is no direct relation between price rise and the storage of foodgrains in private godowns.

(d): The data regarding incidences of pilferage/theft/wastage of foodgrains in food storage godowns controlled by the Food Corporation of India (FCI) (both public and private) is given at Annexure-II. The summarized position is given below:-

ANNEXURE REFERRED TO IN REPLY TO PART (d) OF THE STARRED QUESTION NO. *282 DUE FOR ANSWER ON 06.12.2016 IN THE LOK SABHA

(A): STEPS TAKEN BY FOOD CORPORATION OF INDIA (FCI) TO PREVENT PILFERAGE/THEFT/WASTAGE OF FOODGRAINS

- 1. Installation of Barbed wires fencing of boundary walls and provision of high mast lights in the godowns / complexes.
- 2. Deployment of Security staff of FCI as well as other agencies like Home Guards, DGR sponsored agency & Special Police Officers and state armed police on need basis.
- 3. Security Inspections as well as surprise checks of the depots are conducted from time to time at various levels to detect and plug any security lapses.
- 4. Lodging of FIRs with the Police where pilferage and theft has come to notice. Apart from this, departmental action including recovery of loss has been resorted to as a deterrent measure.
- 5 Apart from the above, monitoring by installing CCTV camera systems and other gadgets is also being done and CCTV cameras are being installed in all FCI owned depots.

(B): STEPS TAKEN BY FCI TO PRESERVE THE QUALITY OF PROCURED FOODGRAINS TO PREVENT DAMAGE:

Before the commencement of Rabi and Kharif Marketing Seasons, Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food & Public Distribution, Department of Food & Public Distribution, Govt. of India issues uniform specifications for procurement of foodgrains for the Central Pool. These uniform specifications are circulated to F.C.I. and all State Govts./Agencies with instructions to ensure that foodgrains are procured strictly in accordance with the uniform specifications.

2. Foodgrains procured by F.C.I. and State Govts/Agencies are stored in covered godowns as well as in CAP (cover and plinth).

- 3. During storage, the following steps are taken for safe storage and preservations of foodgrains:
 - 1) All godowns are constructed as per specifications.
 - 2) Foodgrains are stored by adopting proper scientific code of storage practices.
 - 3) Adequate dunnage materials such as wooden crates, bamboo mats, polythene sheets are used to check migration of moisture from the floor to the foodgrains.
 - 4) Fumigation covers, nylon ropes, nets and insecticides for control of stored grain insect pests are provided in all the godowns.
 - 5) Prophylactic (spraying of insecticides) and curative treatments (fumigation) are carried out regularly and timely in godowns for the control of stored grain insect pests.
 - 6) Effective rat control measures, both in covered godowns as well as in CAP storage are used.
 - 7) Foodgrains in 'Cover and Plinth' (CAP) storage are stored on elevated plinths and wooden crates are used as dunnage material. Stacks are properly covered with specifically fabricated low-density black polythene water -proof covers and tied with nylon ropes/nets.
 - 8) Regular periodic inspections of the stocks/godowns are undertaken by qualified and trained staff and all senior officers. The health of the foodgrains is monitored at regular intervals by a system of checks and super checks at different levels. Following Checks and Super checks are conducted in the godowns by FCI to ensure proper preservation of foodgrains in the storage.
 - a) Fortnightly inspection of stocks on 100% basis by Technical Assistant.
 - b) Monthly inspection by Manager(QC)
 - c) Quaterly inspection by AGM(QC)
 - d) Super Checks by Regional, Zonal and FCI Hqrs Squads.
 - 9) The principle of "First in First Out" (FIFO) is followed to the extent possible so as to avoid longer storage of foodgrains in godowns.
 - 10) Only covered rail wagons are used for movement of foodgrains so as to avoid damage during transit.
 - 11) Damage Monitoring Cells have been set up at District, Regional and Zonal levels to regularly monitor quality of stocks and reduce damages.
