Will the Minister of URBAN DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state:

- (a) whether urban population is likely to increase by 300 million by 2050 as per United Nations World Cities Report;
- (b) if so, the details thereof and the Government's reaction thereto; and
- (c) the details of long-term policies plans being framed by the Government in this regard?

ANSWER

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF URBAN DEVELOPMENT  
(RAO INDERJIT SINGH)

(a) & (b): Yes, Madam. As per United Nations, Department of Economic and Social Affairs report titled "World Cities Report 2016," India's urban population is likely to increase by an additional 300 million by the year 2050. The Government views rapid urbanisation as an opportunity for economic development. Urban Development is a State Subject. Government of India supports the efforts of State Governments by implementing various schemes and by providing technical and financial assistance to States. The Government has launched programmes of (i) The Smart City Mission which aims to cover 100 cities in the country for improving infrastructure and services including smart solutions and area based development. (ii) Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT), covering 500 cities of the country having population more than 1 lakh and other identified categories, for

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providing financial assistance to Mission cities for water supply, liquid waste management, development of city parks and non motorized transport. (iii) The Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM) covers all urban local bodes of the country and provides financial assistance for construction of individual household toilets, community and public toilets and for scientific management of solid waste.

(c): Urban Development is a State Subject. Government has issued the following important policies/advisories for States:

- (i) Urban and Regional Development Plans Formulation and Implementation (URDPFI) Guidelines.
- (ii) Model Building Bye-Laws (MBBL), 2016
- (iii) National Urban Transport Policy
- (iv) Harmonised Guidelines and Space Standards for Barrier Free Built Environment for Persons with Disability and Elderly Persons.
- (v) National Urban Sanitation Policy
- (vi) Manuals on Water Supply & Treatment, Sewerage an Sewage Treatment, Solid Wastage Management and their maintenance.
- (vii) Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT) Reforms (given in annexure).
