UNUSED AIRSTRIPS

SHRI PRAHLAD SINGH PATEL 226.

Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION तागर विमानन मंत्री

be pleased to state:-

(a) whether the Government proposes to revamp the existing unused airstrips for

starting the commercial operations from there;

(b) if so, the number of airstrips lying unused in the country and the expected expenditure for restoring them in order to start commercial operations from those airstrips; and

(c) the steps taken/proposed to be taken in this regard?

ANSWER

(a) to (c): Yes, Madam. There are total 476 airports/airstrips in the Country belonging to various agencies viz Airports Authority of India (AAI), State Governments, Army, Navy, Indian Air Force (IAF), Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA), private developers etc. Out of total 476 airports, only 75 airports (70 AAI and 5 others) have scheduled flight operations whereas other airports are either un-served or under-served. The newly approved National Civil Aviation Policy, 2016, has a provision for promotion of regional Connectivity by way of revival of un-served and under-served airports/airstrips. Revival of such airports is "demand-driven", depending on firm demand from the airline operators and where the State Government agrees to provide various concessions envisaged in the Policy. There are certain areas of the country where airstrips/airports are unserved or under-served as viability of the operations has always been a matter of concern. In order to address the issue of connectivity, the Policy provides for development of airstrips/airports, without insisting on their financial viability at an indicative cost of Rs.50 crores to Rs.100 crores.
