2583. SHRIMATI KOTHAPALLI GEETHA:

Will the Minister of **HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE** be pleased to state:

- (a) whether a large number of Indian students graduating from foreign medical institutions appear for mandatory screening examination by National Board of Examinations (NBE)/ Medical Council of India (MCI) for practicing in the country and if so, the details thereof;
- (b) whether over the past many years the pass percentage of students appearing for this examination is very low;
- (c) if so, the details thereof and the reasons therefor; and
- (d) the remedial measures taken/ proposed to be taken by the Government to improve the situation to make use of the services of such students who graduated from foreign countries in view of the shortage of doctors/health workers in the country?

(a) to (d): The number of candidates appeared and passed in the last three years is as follows:

2015	12125	1374
2016	12283	1160

Several representations were received in the Ministry with regard to high difficulty level of the Screening Test. In view of representations received, the Central Government had constituted an Expert Committee under the Chairmanship of Prof. P.K. Julka to look into the issue. The Committee in its report held that the level of Screening Test is of appropriate difficulty. Government has since accepted the report.

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
