**1950. SHRI C.R. PATIL:**

Will the Minister of **HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE** be pleased to state:

- (a) the details and status of the work undertaken/proposed to be undertaken under the National Strategic Plan 2017–24 aimed at eradicating HIV/AIDS by 2030;
- (b) the details and status of the work undertaken/proposed to be undertaken under the Mission Sampark; and
- (c) the details of the targets fixed by the Government under the scheme for the ensuing years and the details of action plan in this regard, year-wise?

**ANSWER

(SMT. ANUPRIYA PATEL)**

(a): The National Strategic Plan (NSP) for HIV/AIDS and Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) 2017-24 was launched by the Government on World AIDS Day, i.e. 1<sup>st</sup> December 2017. The NSP aims to achieve the following by 2024:

1. Reduce new infections by 80% (baseline 2010).
2. Link 95% of estimated People Living with HIV/AIDS (PLHIV) to care services.
3. Ensure Anti Retro-viral Therapy (ART) initiation and retention of 95% of PLHIVs for sustained viral suppression.
4. Eliminate mother to child transmission of HIV and Syphilis by 2020.
5. Eliminate HIV related stigma and discrimination.

(b): Mission Sampark, launched on 01<sup>st</sup> Dec 2017, is an initiative of Government of India to reach out to the Lost to Follow Up people living with HIV/AIDS and linking them back as much as possible to Anti Retro-viral Therapy (ART), to improve their quality of life.

Mission Sampark aims at cleaning the data pertaining to PLHIV at ART Centers, analyzing it and have Contact Drive through out-reach activities by peers to reach out to Lost to Follow Up people living with HIV/AIDS and put them back to ART.

A workshop regarding this has already been held on 7<sup>th</sup> Dec 2017.
