INDO-CHINA RELATIONS

Will the Minister of EXTERNAL AFFAIRS be pleased to state:

- (a) whether tension in strategic relations between India and China is further increasing;**
- (b) if so, the details thereof along with the reasons therefor;**
- (c) the efforts made to ameliorate differences in matters related to nuclear responsibilities and bilateral relations; and**
- (d) the other steps taken by the Government to strengthen relations with China in future?**

ANSWER

(a) to (d) India's engagement with China is multifaceted. In areas where we have commonality of views, engagement has expanded and upgraded in recent years. Issues where there are differences are being handled through dialogue to seek a fair, reasonable and mutually acceptable solution based on mutual respect and due sensitivity to each other's interests, concerns and aspirations.

Both sides share the view that India-China bilateral relationship has an important role to play in the 21st Century in Asia and in the world, and that it serves the shared interest of the two sides to strengthen their Closer Developmental Partnership.

In view of the significance of the bilateral relationship, both sides are working towards utilizing their bilateral dialogue mechanisms to promote mutually beneficial cooperation, and enhancing communication at all levels in order to build greater trust and understanding.

Both sides agree that progress in bilateral relations should be guided by the consensus reached between their leaders, that at a time of global uncertainty, India-China relations are a factor of stability and India and China, in their relationship, must not allow differences to become disputes.
