Will the Minister of HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Government proposes to set up new Medical Colleges under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme in aspirational districts/all districts of the country and if so, the details thereof, district/ location-wise including Jharkhand;
- (b) if so, the number of such Medical Colleges being set up/set up, State/UT-wise including Odisha;
- (c) the details of funds sanctioned/released/utilized/ to be released for the same, college-wise along with the fund sharing ratio of Union and State Governments thereon;
- (d) the present status of such proposed medical colleges including Bhawanipatna in Kalahandi district, Bhandara district of Maharashtra, Kundwa in Gondia district along with the time by which these are likely to be fully functional;
- (e) the steps taken by the Government for effective and smooth implementation of said scheme along with the reasons for delay, if any, in setting up of such Colleges in the aspirational districts including Odisha; and
- (f) whether the Government proposes to add more aspirational districts to this program including Kabirdham district of Chhattisgarh, Balghat district, Garhwa district in Jharkhand and if so, the details thereof along with the steps taken by the Government in this regard so far?

ANSWER

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (DR. BHARATI PRAVIN PAWAR)

(a) to (f): The Ministry of Health & Family Welfare administers a Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS) for 'Establishment of new Medical Colleges attached with existing district/referral hospitals' with preference to underserved areas and aspirational districts, where there is no existing Government or private medical college. Under the Scheme, the envisaged 157 new

medical colleges have been approved in three phases including 40 in aspirational districts. The details of these medical colleges approved in aspirational districts along with details of funds released are at Annexure-I.

Release of funds under the Scheme is based on pace of expenditure, release of corresponding State share and receipt of demand from State Government with fund sharing between Central Government and States is in the ratio of 90:10 for North eastern and Special category States and 60:40 for other States. As per the Scheme guidelines, the planning, execution and commissioning of the projects is to be done by the State Government.

Medical Colleges were sanctioned in Gondia district of Maharashtra in Phase-I and in Kalahandi district of Odisha in Phase-III of the said Scheme. Under Phase-III of the Scheme, all 75 Medical Colleges proposed to be set up are sanctioned.
