*38. SHRI GIRISH BHALCHANDRA BAPAT: DR. PRITAM GOPINATH RAO MUNDE:

Will the Minister of HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Government has supplemented the efforts of the States/UTs in the healthcare sector through various Centrally Sponsored Schemes and Central Sector Schemes;
- (b) if so, the details thereof along with the financial assistance provided to each State and Union Territory, scheme-wise;
- (c) whether access to healthcare services, provision of essential medicines and scarcity of doctors are the bottlenecks in the primary healthcare scenario;
- (d) if so, the response of the Government thereto; and
- (e) the steps taken by the Government to address these bottlenecks along with the success achieved so far in this regard?

ANSWER THE MINISTER OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (DR MANSUKH MANDAVIYA)

(a) to (e) A Statement is laid on the Table of the House.

STATEMENT REFERRED TO IN REPLY TO LOK SABHA STARRED QUESTION NO. 38 FOR 3RD FEBRUARY, 2023

- (a) & (b) The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare is implementing various Centrally Sponsored Schemes through States/UTs like National Health Mission (NHM), Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB-PMJAY), Establishment of New Medical Colleges & Increase of Seats in existing Government Medical Colleges, Pradhan Mantri -Ayushman Bharat Health Infrastructure Mission (PM-ABHIM) etc. and also executing Central Sector Schemes like Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY), National AIDS and STD Control Programme etc. for supplementing the efforts of the States/UTs in healthcare sector and improving health quality standards in the country. The details of financial assistance provided under few Schemes are given at Annexure.
- (c) to (e) The access to healthcare services, provision of essential medicines and doctors are the thrust areas for improvement of healthcare delivery for which the Government has taken several steps like implementation of Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana, operationalization of Ayushman Bharat Health and Wellness Centers (AB-HWCs), free drug initiatives, free diagnostic initiatives, Jan Aushadhi Pariyojana, establishment of more All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMSs), Medical Colleges, augmentation of medical seats etc. Some of the results of these initiatives are given below:
 - i. Over 20.97 Crore Ayushman Cards have been generated and more than 4.21 Crore treatments have been provided to AB-PMJAY beneficiaries. Rs.49,469 Crores worth treatment have been authorized. 26,267 private & public sector hospitals have been empaneled for treatment and the Scheme has now been extended to transgender persons also.
 - ii. 1,54,070 AB-HWCs have already been operationalized in the country.
 - iii. Over 28 Crore ABHA IDs (Ayushman Bharat Health Accounts IDs) have been generated.
 - iv. Administrative approvals have been accorded across all eligible States/UTs for establishment / strengthening of 6535 Rural HWCs, 264 Urban HWCs, 426 BPHUs (Block Public Health Units), 197 District IPHLs (Integrated Public Health Labs) and 159 CCBs (Critical Care Blocks) under PM-ABHIM.

- v. Total number of ASHAs has been increased from 8.95 lakhs in FY 2013-14 to 9.94 lakhs in FY 2021-22.
- vi. Pradhan Mantri National Dialysis Programme (PMNDP) has been implemented in all 36 States / UTs in 633 Districts at 1342 Centers. Total 16.89 lakh patients have already availed dialysis services.
- vii. India has become the chair of the world's biggest inter-governmental and multilateral forum on Digital Health, Global Digital Health partnership. *eSanjeevani* OPD services have been launched and integrated with 3.74 lakh Common Service Centers (CSCs).
- viii. 267 new Medical Colleges have been established and 48,415 MBBS seats and 33,374 PG seats have been increased in the past eight years.
