Will the Minister of **HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE** be pleased to state:

- (a) the details of the Free Drugs and Diagnostics Service initiative under the National Health Mission;
- (b) whether the Government has conducted any study to gauge the efficacy of the initiative after so many years of its implementation;
- (c) if so, the details thereof including in Maharashtra and if not, the reasons therefor;
- (d) the details of average number of Outpatients in Health and Wellness Centres (HWCs), State/ UT-wise with particular reference to Maharashtra; and
- (e) the details of measures being taken to increase Outpatient count in Health and Wellness Centres?

## ANSWER THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (DR. BHARATI PRAVIN PAWAR)

(a) to (c) Under NHM financial support is provided to States / UTs for provision of free essential medicines in public health facilities based on the requirements posed by States/UTs in their Programme Implementation Plans (PIPs) within their overall resource envelope. Ministry has recommended facility wise Essential Drugs List (EDL) to be made available at the public healthcare facilities to ensure widespread access to essential medicines. No of medicines recommended at varius facilities are given below. However States have the flexibility to add more.

The programme was launched with the aim to provide accessible and affordable pathological and radiological diagnostics services closer to the community which in turn reduces the Out-of-Pocket Expenditure (OOPE). (d) The details of State/UTs-wise Footfall at AB-HWCs as on 1st February 2023 including Maharashtra is attached at **Annexure.** 

(e) Various steps have been taken by GoI to increase the outpatients in AB-HWCs are as under:

- The expanded package comprising 12 services are aimed to be provided by AB-HWCs includes screening, prevention, control and management of non-communicable diseases, care for common eye and ENT problems, basic oral health care, elderly and palliative health care services, emergency medical services and screening and basic management of mental health ailments.
- Number of essential medicines and essential diagnostics at AB-HWCs have been increased.
- HWCs are connected through E-Sanjeevni Tele-Consultation to provide specialist consultation in case of need.
- AB-HWCs ensure continuity of care through appropriate referrals and optimal home and community follow-up.
- Wellness-related activities like Yoga, Zumba, and Meditation, 42 annual health calendar days are celebrated by each AB-HWC.
- Community platforms like Village Health Sanitation & Nutrition Committee and Mahila Arogya Samiti and facility-based platforms like Jan Arogya Samitis are instrumental in raising awareness of National Health Programs and health initiatives.
- Block Health Melas and Melas at AB-HWCs are conducted to create awareness among thousands of people desiring to avail quality healthcare services.
