**MISSION INDRADHANUSH**

**1569: SHRIMATI SAJDA AHMED:**

Will the Minister of **HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE** be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Government has conducted any survey on the progress of vaccination coverage of children upto two years of age under the Indradhanush Scheme ;
- (b) if so, the details thereof, State/UT-wise including Howrah district in West Bengal;
- (c) the impetus given by the Government for vaccination coverage particularly in the scheduled tribe and minority concentrated districts;
- (d) whether the COVID-19 vaccination drive has affected the progress of other immunization programmes among children and mothers and if so, the details thereof; and
- (e) the funds allocated under the Indradhanush scheme during the last three years and the current year, State/UT-wise?

**ANSWER**

**THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE  
(DR. BHARATI PRAVIN PAWAR)**

- (a) Government has conducted National Family Health Survey (NFHS)-5 (2019-2021) which reported an increase of 14.6% points in the Full Immunization Coverage (FIC) of children up to 2 years of age from 62% in NFHS-4 to 76.6% in NFHS-5.
- (b) State/UT wise Full Immunization Coverage of children aged 12-23 months as per NFHS-5 is placed at Annexure 1. FIC of Howrah district, West Bengal is 87.8% (NFHS-5).
- (c) Universal Immunization Programme (UIP) is implemented across all States/UTs in India. Mission Indradhanush, a special catch-up campaign is conducted periodically in the districts of low immunization coverage including tribal districts.
- (d) COVID-19 pandemic had impacted the immunization coverage and children and pregnant women were left out or dropped out from the due vaccine doses under Routine Immunization. Two rounds of Mission Indradhanush were conducted in 2021 and 2022 to reach and vaccinate these children and pregnant women with the missed vaccine doses. .
- (e) Funds allocated for Routine Immunization (RI) are utilized for carrying out Mission Indradhanush activities. The State/UT wise Central Release under RI for the last three years and current year is placed at Annexure 2.
