Will the Minister of HOUSING AND URBAN AFFAIRS be pleased to state:

- (a) the funds allocated under Smart Cities Mission (SCM) during the last five years, State-wise;**
- (b) the names of the cities identified under SCM in Andhra Pradesh, phase-wise;**
- (c) whether the Government has looked into issues of rapid urbanization, converting water bodies for residential requirements and unscientific approach towards the development of the city which has led to water inundation as per experts; and**
- (d) if so, the steps/measures taken by the Government to incorporate better and more sustainable urban development techniques as part of its SCM?**

ANSWER

- (a) & (b) : Government of India launched Smart Cities Mission (SCM) on 25 June 2015. 100 Smart Cities have been selected through 4 rounds of competition from January 2016 to June 2018. In the State of Andhra Pradesh, 4 cities, i.e. Kakinada & Visakhapatnam (Round-1), Tirupati (Round-2) and Amaravati (Round-3) have been selected for development as Smart Cities.**

As per SCM Guidelines, Central Government will provide financial support to the extent of ₹ 48,000 crore over five years i.e., on an average ₹ 100 crore per city per year. An equal amount on a matching basis will be contributed by the State Government/Union Territory (UT)/Urban Local Body (ULB). This ratio was later changed to 90:10 for the 13 Smart Cities in North-Eastern/Hilly States. The State/Union Territory (UT)/-wise details of funds released and utilization thereof under SCM are given in Annexure-I.

(c) : Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (MoHUA) implements urban programs and Missions which help deal with issues related to rapid urbanization across all towns and cities of the country. Under Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT) launched in June 2015, 16 water body rejuvenation projects worth ₹ 76 crore were taken up. AMRUT 2.0 has been launched on 1 October 2021 for 5 years. So far, 2,129 water body rejuvenation projects worth ₹ 3,751 crore have been approved in 1,430 ULBs under AMRUT 2.0. To help tackle water inundation, 719 Storm Water Drainage (SWD) projects worth ₹ 1,622 crore have been completed and another 93 SWD projects worth ₹ 1,376 crore are in progress under AMRUT.

(d) : Projects under SCM are aimed at improving liveability, economic-ability, and sustainability in cities. The focus is on sustainable and inclusive development and the idea is to look at developing compact areas, creating replicable models which will act as light-houses to other aspiring cities through work on four pillars of comprehensive development — institutional, physical, social, and economic infrastructure. Projects under the Mission, inter alia, include development of Integrated Command & Control Centers (ICCCs), Smart Energy, Smart water & wastewater infrastructure, Smart Mobility, Vibrant Urban Spaces including smart streets, etc. Most Smart Cities have addressed issues related to sustainable development, climate change, disaster preparedness, mitigation and adaptation as part of their projects. Climate Smart Cities Assessment Framework (CSCAF) was launched in 2019 as a mechanism to strengthen climate-sensitive development practices in cities.
