(c) to (e): Government of India is implementing a comprehensive range of central sector as well as centrally sponsored schemes and programmes for the welfare of farmers, to provide incentive and enhance production across the States. These schemes and programmes encompass entire spectrum of agriculture including credit, insurance, income support, infrastructure, crops including horticulture, seeds, mechanization, marketing, organic and natural farming, farmer collectives, irrigation, extension, procurement of crops from farmers at minimum support prices, etc. The ultimate aim of these initiatives is to secure the well-being of farmers by providing an incentive and facilitating an increase in overall agricultural production, including food grains, and enhancing productivity.

Further, National Food Security Mission (NFSM), being implemented in the identified districts of 28 states including Union Territories of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh, which aims at increasing foodgrain production including rice, wheat, pulses, coarse cereals and nutri- cereals through area expansion and productivity enhancement, restoring soil fertility and productivity at individual farm level and enhancing farm level economy.

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
