'FINANCIAL RELIEF'

114: MS. DEBASREE CHAUDHURI:

Will the Minister of **FINANCE** be pleased to state:

- a) the details of sectors which have been provided financial relief of Rs.20.97 lakh crores by the Government and whether it has desired positive impact;
- b) whether any increase has been reported in employment opportunities due to this financial relief and if so, the details thereof;
- c) whether economic activities have increased in the country due to this financial relief and if so, the details thereof; and
- d) the extent to which the benefits have reached to the poor people due to this financial relief?

ANSWER MINISTER OF STATE (FINANCE) (SHRI PANKAJ CHAUDHARY)

(a) to (d): During the year 2020, Government had announced the following packages with the objective of fighting COVID-19 and making the country self-reliant, which including measures announced by the RBI, involved a total amount of Rs.29,87,641 crore: (i) A relief package titled Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Package on 26.03.2020 (ii) AatmaNirbhar Bharat Packages (ANB) 1.0, 2.0, and 3.0 announced on 13th -17th May, 2020, 12th October, 2020 & 12th November 2020 respectively. Besides, a Rs. 6.28 lakh crore COVID stimulus package was also announced on 28.06.2021. A Statement indicating details of these packages, including sectors covered is at **Annexure-I**.

Atma Nirbhar Bharat Rozgar Yojana (ABRY) announced under ANB incentivizes jobs creation wherein Government of India contributes both the employees' and employers' share of contribution (12% of wages), in respect of eligible employees, in EPFO registered establishments, for two years. The benefits are available for new employees employed on or after 1st October 2020 and up to 31st March 2022 or those who lost jobs during COVID 19 and did not join any EPF covered establishment up to 30.09.2020. As on 18.11.2021, total benefits of Rs. 2561.10 Crore have been given to 39.35 lakh employees through 1,15,550 Establishments. Further, to help MSMEs/Small businesses to meet their operational liabilities and resume businesses, Emergency Credit Line Guarantee Scheme (ECLGS) under ANB (revised from time to time) with an overall ceiling of Rs.4.5 lakh crore on guarantees as on date has helped businesses restart operations and retention of jobs. It has impacted around 5.45 crore employees as on 19.11.2021. Besides, Production Linked Incentive Scheme (PLI) for various sectors envisage creating national manufacturing champions and generate employment opportunities. ANB comprises of various long-term schemes/programmes/policies whose objectives are to fight COVID-19 and to make the country self-reliant, outcomes of which would be visible over a period of time.

The increase in economic activities is evident by many high frequency indicators and parameters such as: (a) Industrial production in August, 2021 reaching 103 % of its pre-pandemic August 2019 level with manufacturing witnessing full recovery in most of the use-based categories (b) Eight-core industry output crossing its pre-COVID level of September 2019 led by coal, natural gas, steel, cement and electricity (c) PMI Services accelerating to a decadal high of 58.4 in October, 2021, on the back of sustained uptick in rail freight

activity, growth in E-way bills and highway toll collections and increase in air freight and passenger traffic, among others (d) Increase in GST collections (e) Merchandise exports in October, 2021 crossing US\$ 30 billion mark for the seventh consecutive month (f) merchandize imports in FY 2021-22 crossing their pre-pandemic 2019 levels in October 2021 (g) FDI achieving the US\$ 20 billion mark in the first five months of FY 22 as in FY 21. A Statement indicating benefits provided under the schemes to the poor, wherever applicable is at Annexure-II.

Details of PMGKP

- (i) Insurance scheme for health workers fighting COVID-19 was launched w.e.f. 30.03.2020 to provide comprehensive personal accident cover of Rs. 50 lakh to healthcare providers. The scheme has been extended and is valid upto April, 2022.
- (ii) PM Garib Kalyan Ann Yojana- Additional allocation of food grain @ 5 kg per person per month free of cost was provided to all beneficiaries covered under the targeted public distribution system including those covered under Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT). Further, Pulses according to regional preferences @ 1 kg per family were provided for three months, free of cost. The scheme was extended till November, 2020. The scheme of free foodgrains was reintroduced for the months of May 2021 to November, 2021. It has now been extended to March 2022.
- (iii) **Benefit to farmers:** The first installment of Rs. 2,000 due in 2020-21 was front-loaded and paid in April 2020 itself under the PM KISAN Yojana, covering about 8.7 crore farmers
- (iv) Cash transfers
 - a) An ex-gratia of Rs. 500 per month for three months to a total of 20.40 crores (approx.) PMJDY women account-holders.
 - b) Free of cost LPG cylinders (three) to 8 crore beneficiaries of Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana (PMUY).
 - c) Wage-earners, earning below Rs 15,000 per month, in businesses having less than 100 workers, were provided Twenty-four (24) percent of the monthly wages into their PF accounts, for three months. The scheme was extended for another three months, i.e., till August 2020.
 - d) An amount of Rs.1000/- to around 3 crore aged widows and people in Divyang category.
- (v) MGNREGA wages increased by Rs. 20 with effect from 1 April, 2020.
- (vi) **Self-Help groups:** Limit of collateral free lending to Self-Help groups was increased from Rs. 10 lakh to Rs. 20 lakh for women organized through 63 lakhs Self Help Groups
- (vii) Other components of PM Garib Kalyan package
 - a) **Organized sector:** Employees' Provident Fund Regulations amended to include Pandemic as the reason to allow non-refundable advance of 75 percent of the amount or three months of the wages, whichever is lower, from the accounts.
 - b) State Governments were directed to utilise Welfare Fund for Building and Other Constructions Workers to provide assistance and support to 3.5 Crore registered workers of the fund to protect them against economic disruptions.
 - c) District Mineral Fund: The State Government were asked to utilise the funds available under District Mineral Fund (DMF) for supplementing and augmenting facilities of medical testing, screening and other requirements in connection with preventing the spread of COVID-19 pandemic as well as treating the patients affected with this pandemic.
