Conservation of Son Beel

1163. SHRI KRIPANATH MALLAH:

Will the Minister of ENVIRONMENT, FOREST AND CLIMATE CHANGE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Government is aware about the largest natural fishery of Asia i.e. Son Beel:
- (b) whether the Government is also aware about the specialty of Son Beel that during winter season it becomes hilly farm land where rice cultivation is done and from March onwards it becomes a natural lake with water and soil of Son Beel suitable for natural fish breeding while in winter season, it becomes a migratory bird's sanctuary;
- (c) whether the Government is also aware about the tragic part that is the absence of any prohibitory measures leading to the migratory birds being mercilessly killed by people for food;
- (d) whether the Government has planned for development/conservation of Son Beel; and
- (e) if so, the details thereof?

ANSWER

- (a) &(b) Yes. Son Beel is one of the largest natural water body in Asia where during winter season, it becomes suitable for paddy cultivation and during rainy season, it is full of water and fish breeding takes place naturally. In the early parts of winter season, birds from different areas migrate in Son Beel. As per revenue records, Son Beel is surrounded by 100 nos. of villages and more than 50,000 population is directly dependent on Son beel for their livelihood by way of fishing and paddy cultivation.
- (c) As reported by the State Govt. of Assam, to avert harm to the migratory birds, forest staff is deputed to perform patrolling in Son Beel area and as a result 3 offence reports have been drawn and 7 offenders have been arrested and sent to judicial custody for trial.

(d) &(e) As informed by the State Government of Assam, Fishery Department and Assam Tourism Development Corporation have taken some developmental works in Son Beel. However, till date, no proposal has been received by Government of India from the State Government of Assam asking for funds for conservation, restoration, rejuvenation and management of Son Beel under National Plan for Conservation of Aquatic Ecosystem (NPCA) scheme.
