Will the Minister of HOUSING AND URBAN AFFAIRS be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that urban areas are expected to house forty percent of population of the country and contribute seventy five per cent to GDP by 2030;
- (b) if so, the details thereof;
- (c) whether most of the cities in the country are lacking urban city planning;
- (d) if so, the details thereof;
- (e) whether there is a need to collaborate all relevant sectors for effective project planning and implementation; and
- (f) if so, the steps taken by the Union Government in this direction?

### ANSWER

# MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HOUSING AND URBAN AFFAIRS (SHRI KAUSHAL KISHORE)

(a) & (b) As per Report of the Technical Group on 'Population Projections for India and States(2011-2036)', published by the National Commission on Population, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, in July, 2020, the projected urban population for India would be 37.25% of total country's population on  $1^{st}$  March, 2030. Further, the Mid-Term Appraisal of the  $11^{th}$  Five Year Plan projects the urban share in total GDP at 75 per cent in 2030.

(c) & (d) Urban planning falls under the domain of respective State / Union Territory Governments. According to the Report on 'Reforms in Urban Planning Capacity in India' brought out by National Institution for Transforming India (NITI) Aayog in September, 2021, about 52% of the statutory towns and 76% of census towns do not have Master Plans to guide their spatial growth and infrastructural investments.

(e) (& (f) Urban development being a State subject, project planning and implementation is the responsibility of State / UT Governments.
