Will the Minister of INFORMATION AND BROADCASTING be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Government has received any proposals suggesting that the new Central Media Accreditation Guidelines should be withdrawn;
- (b) if so, the details thereof;
- (c) whether the Government has or proposed to hold public consultations on the new guidelines;
- (d) if so, the details thereof and if not, the reasons therefor;
- (e) whether the Government intends to address ambiguities in the new guidelines such as the failure to define police verification; and
- (f) if so, the details thereof and if not, the reasons therefor?

- (a) to (b) The Government has received certain comments from Media bodies etc. on "The Central Media Accreditation Guidelines, 2022" dated 1st February, 2022.
- (c) to (d) "The Central Media Accreditation Guidelines, 2022" were formulated after taking into consideration suggestions received by the Press Information Bureau (PIB) from various stakeholders including Members of the erstwhile Central Press Accreditation Committee, Media Associations, representatives of online media, etc.

(e) to (f) As per the procedure adopted for more than three decades,

PIB accreditation is granted only after due Police Verification and

concurrence of Ministry of Home Affairs.
