LONG WAITING FOR TREATMENT IN AIIMS

2124. SHRI SHRIMATI GOMATI SAI: SHRI VIVEK NARAYAN SHEJWALKAR:

Will the MINISTER OF HEALTH & FAMILY WELFARE be pleased to state:

- (a) Whether the number of patients in AIIMS Institutes has increased constantly during 2019-2020 to 2021-22 and if so, average number of patients visiting per day, AIIMS-wise including AIIMS, Delhi and Raipur;
- (b) Whether the patients in such institutes have to wait for a long period of time to get even basic treatments including at AIIMS, Delhi and Raipur; and
- (c) If so, steps being taken by the Government to ensure that the patients do not have to wait for longer period for treatment in these institutes?

ANSWER THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (DR. BHARATI PRAVIN PAWAR)

(a) Due to restrictions related to Covid-19 pandemic, the number of patients visiting OPD in various AIIMS went down as compared to 2019-20. In case of AIIMS New Delhi, average number of per day OPD patients declined from 6812 in 2019-20 to 1882 in 2020-21. Information in respect of 6 other functional AIIMS, set up under PMSSY, including AIIMS Raipur, is as under:

(b) & (c) There is no long waiting period for patients in new AIIMS set up under PMSSY. As far as AIIMS, New Delhi is concerned, 80% of OPD appointments for new patients are

provided online for upto 30 days in advance and remaining 20% of OPD appointments are for walk-in patients. In addition, patients given dates by their doctors are provided appointments through Single Window Exist Counter (SWEC) and departmental nodal persons. New appointments have a waiting of not more than one month.

Steps taken by various AIIMS to handle the increasing patient load includes, among others, screening clinics; increase in the number of special clinics and sample collection counters; implementation of Hospital Management Information System and Queue Management System, tele-consultation; increase in number of operation theaters and strengthening the manpower.
