3165. SMT. SANDHYA RAY:

Will the Minister of Women and Child Development be pleased to state:

- (a) the number of girls benefited through Ladli Yojana across the country Statewise and district-wise in Madhya Pradesh during the last five years;
- (b) the type of security and facilities being provided through One Stop Centre;
- (c) whether the Government proposes to open the said centre in Bhind district if so, the details thereof; and
- (d) the incentives being provided to girls by the Government for education?

ANSWER

MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF WOMEN AND CHILD DEVELOPMENT (SHRIMATI SAVITRI THAKUR)

(a) Ladli Yojana is neither a Central Sponsored Scheme nor a Central Sector scheme. It is a state-run scheme. Therefore, the data in respect of this scheme is not maintained at the central level.

(b) The One Stop Centre (OSC) Scheme is being implemented across the country since 1st April 2015. The objective of the One Stop Centre Scheme is to provide integrated support and assistance under one roof to women affected by violence and those in distress both in private and public spaces. It provides both emergency and non-emergency services like medical aid, legal aid and advice, temporary shelter, police assistance and psychosocial counselling.

(c) One Stop Centre (OSC) is approved and functional in the Bhind district of Madhya Pradesh,

(d) Government is implementing various schemes to incentivize girls' education. These initiatives aim to promote gender equality and ensure that girls have access to quality education.

Samagra Shiksha is an integrated scheme for school education from pre-school to class XII, supporting the implementation of the National Education Policy 2020 and the Right to Education Act, 2009. It emphasizes early childhood care and education, foundational literacy and numeracy, a holistic and inclusive curriculum, enhancing learning outcomes, bridging social and gender gaps, and ensuring equity and inclusion at all levels of education.

Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya (KGBV) scheme seeks to bridge gender and social category gaps in school education by providing residential schooling facilities for girls up to Class XII. Under the scheme, the girls in the age group of 10-18 years from Scheduled Caste (SC), Scheduled Tribe (ST), Other Backward Class (OBC), minority communities, and BPL families are covered.

Vigyan Jyoti Programme encourages girls to pursue education and careers in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) fields to improve gender balance. It targets meritorious girls from Class IX to Class XII and includes student-parent counselling, career counselling, additional academic support classes, tinkering activities, special lectures, visits to scientific institutions, labs, industries, and science camps and workshops.
