3509. Shri Haribhai Patel : Shri Raju Bista :

Will the Minister of Women and Child Development be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Government has recently increased support for Child Care Institutions (CCIs) under the Mission Vatsalya scheme and if so, the details of the support provided during FY 2023-24, State-wise;
- (b) whether there have been any enhancements in non-institutional care services for children in need of care and protection and if so, the number of children supported under these services;
- (c) whether the Government has established any new District Child Protection Units or Child Welfare Committees as part of Mission Vatsalya and if so, the details of these establishments State-wise;
- (d) whether there are any specific initiatives aimed at improving educational and vocational training opportunities for children in CCIs, if so, the details thereof;
- (e) whether the Government anticipates that these efforts will lead to improved outcomes for children in care and if so, the details thereof along with the manner in which it will be measured; and
- (f) the details of the support provided under Mission Vatsalya in the district of Darjeeling and Kalimpong since its inception?

ANSWER

MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF WOMEN AND CHILD DEVELOPMENT (SHRIMATI SAVITRI THAKUR)

(a): Ministry of Women and Child Development is implementing a Centrally Sponsored Scheme namely 'Mission Vatsalya', through the State/ UT Governments on predefined cost sharing basis between the Central and the State Governments to deliver services for children in difficult circumstances which includes institutional care and non-institutional care services. The Child Care Institutions (CCIs) established under the Mission Vatsalya scheme support, *inter-alia*, age-appropriate education, access to vocational training, recreation, health care, counselling etc. Statewise funds released under Mission Vatsalya Scheme during the year 2023-24 and number of CCIs supported under the scheme during the year 2023-24 is at **Annexure-I.**

(b): Non-Institutional Care support is provided by way of sponsorship, foster care and after care to children in need of care and protection. The number of children approved under Mission Vatsalya Scheme during the financial years 2022-23, 2023-24 and 2024-25 is as under:

(c): Section 106 of Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 provides that every State Government shall constitute a Child Protection Unit for every District, consisting of such officers and other employees as may be appointed by that Government, to take up matters relating to children with a view to ensure the implementation of this Act, including the establishment and maintenance of institutions under this Act, notification of competent authorities in relation to the children and their rehabilitation and co-ordination with various official and non-official agencies concerned and to discharge such other functions as may be prescribed.

Further, Section 27 (i) of Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 provides that the State Government shall by notification in the Official Gazette constitute for every district, one or more Child Welfare Committees for exercising the powers and to discharge the duties conferred on such Committees in relation to children in need of care and protection under this Act and ensure that induction training and sensitisation of all members of the committee is provided within two months from the date of notification.

Details of State-wise District Child Protection Units and Child Welfare Committees supported under Mission Vatsalya during FY 2023-24 are at **Annexure-II.**

- (d): The Child Care Institutions (CCIs) established under the Mission Vatsalya scheme support, *inter-alia*, age-appropriate education, access to vocational training, recreation, health care, counselling etc.
- (e): The improved outcome can be envisaged based on the statutory and service delivery structures created under Mission Vatsalya Scheme, utilization of funds, beneficiaries supported under the scheme, presence of structures at State and District level namely, State Child Protection Society (SCPS), State Adoption Resource Agency (SARA), Child Welfare Committee (CWC), Juvenile Justice Board (JJB), District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) and Child Care Institution (CCI).
- (f): An amount of Rs.119.14 crore has been released under Mission Vatsalya Scheme to the State of West Bengal including the district of Darjeeling and Kalimpong during the financial years 2022-23, 2023-24 and 2024-25 (till date).
