Will the Minister of EXTERNAL AFFAIRS be pleased to state:-

(a) whether PM attended G7 Summit and addressed global leaders on “Forging New Partnerships and Rebuilding International Solidarity”, if so, the details thereof; and

(b) the details of countries visited by PM recently including Australia, France and the Slovak Republic and other countries and outcome thereof along with MoUs signed and benefit accrued to India from such visits till date?

ANSWER

(a) Hon'ble Prime Minister attended the G7 Summit Outreach Session on 16-17 June 2026 in France and addressed three outreach sessions including the session on “Forging New Partnerships and Rebuilding International Solidarity”. In his remarks at the session, Prime Minister underscored the need for building international partnerships based on trust and addressing shared challenges through dialogue, diplomacy and international cooperation. He called for building relations based on equality, dignity and mutual respect and highlighted India’s international initiatives such as the International Solar Alliance, Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure, Global Biofuel Alliance, Mission LiFE and development partnerships focusing on capacity building and skill development guided by India’s ‘humanity first’ approach. The English translation of Prime Minister’s Statement is placed at Annexure-I.

(b) Hon'ble Prime Minister recently visited France (13-18 June 2026), the Slovak Republic (14-15 June 2026), Seychelles (27-29 June 2026), Indonesia (06-08 July 2026), Australia (08-10 July 2026) and New Zealand (10-11 July 2026). During these visits, a number of bilateral documents were signed to further strengthen India's bilateral partnerships; details are placed at Annexure-II.

Outreach Session: Forging New Partnerships and Rebuilding

President Macron,

Friends,

Today's world is more connected and inter-dependent than ever before. A country's energy security, food security, health security, cyber security, and economic security no longer depend only on what happens within its borders. Mobility, data, money, and technology, all link us together.

In times like these, strong partnerships become even more important. But partnerships can succeed only when they are built on trust. Today, the most strategic asset is not minerals, technology, or markets - it is mutual trust.

The trust that technology and supply chains will be used for global good, not as weapons. The trust that development opportunities will not be

limited to a few countries only. Trust that global institutions will fulfil the aspirations of all countries.

Friends,

In the last century, humanity had to go through two world wars. After many sacrifices, the global community developed systems to move forward towards peace, stability and prosperity. The basis of these arrangements was also trust.

But, the trust built over decades and through the contributions of many generations stands under threat today. COVID-19 exposed that the claims of trust and solidarity were often weaker than people believed.

Today the world does not suffer from a shortage of resources; it suffers from a shortage of trust. And the future of our partnerships depends on building this trust.

Former US President Ronald Reagan once said, "Trust, but verify." This message remains relevant even today. It is our responsibility towards future generations to build a trusted, rules-based global order that is suited to the needs of the new era.

Friends,

India has always believed that the whole world is one family. Our actions are guided by the principle of "Sarvajana Hitaya, Sarvajana Sukhaya" which means the welfare and happiness of all.

India's development journey has taught us that progress is most meaningful when it is driven by the aspirations of the people. This principle also shapes our international partnerships. Guided by this vision, India has led several global initiatives, including the International Solar Alliance, Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure, Global Biofuels Alliance, Mission LiFE, and "Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam."

India has always considered it our duty to help countries in times of crisis as a First Responder. During the COVID-19 pandemic, India supplied medicines and vaccines to more than 150 countries.

Whether it was a cyclone in Sri Lanka, an earthquake in Afghanistan, floods in Mozambique, or hurricanes in Cuba and Jamaica, India has always responded with a "Humanity First" approach. The same spirit guides our development partnerships, which focus on capacity building and skill development in partner countries.

India believes that the true test of partnership is not what we build for others, but what we enable others to build for themselves.

Friends,

Today, countries of the Global South have high expectations from the international community. However, they are not looking for aid or support alone, they seek genuine partnership. They want to contribute to and participate in global development, not merely receive its benefits.

We must move beyond the traditional donor-recipient approach and build relationships based on equality. Instead of merely working alongside one another, we must work together towards common goals. Our partnerships should be based on dignity and mutual respect, not dependency. By doing so, we can create a strong foundation for the sustainable development for future generations.

Friends,

International partnerships and global solidarity can only be meaningful if we work together to address shared challenges. India firmly believes that lasting solutions to the ongoing tensions and conflicts in various parts of the world are possible only through dialogue, diplomacy, and international cooperation.

We welcome the progress being made towards peace in West Asia. The conflict has caused significant loss of lives and property in our friendly countries in the region. Disruptions to maritime trade through the Strait of Hormuz have also affected the global economy. Many Indian civilians lost their lives. It is our responsibility to ensure the safety of the seafarers who connect nations through global maritime trade. We must ensure that maritime routes remain secure and that seafarers can perform their duties without fear.

India stands ready to work with all its partners on these issues.

Prime Minister addresses the session on “Forging New Partnerships and Rebuilding International Solidarity” at G7 Summit in France (June 16, 2026)

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi today addressed the Outreach Session on “Forging New Partnerships and Rebuilding International Solidarity”, at the G7 Summit in Evian, France.

2. In his intervention, Prime Minister underlined that, in an interconnected world, where energy, food, health, cyber, and economic security are intertwined, building international partnerships was a necessity for the progress and prosperity of humanity. He further added that, in an uncertain world, trade and technology were being misused for narrow interests, leading to a trust deficit in the international arena. Alluding to the lessons from the COVID pandemic, he called upon nations to focus on building trust and transparency in global partnerships.

3. Sharing India's approach to international cooperation, Prime Minister stated that India has always followed the principle of "humanity first", and this thought continues to be at the center of its efforts, be it pursuing action under the International Solar Alliance, Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure, Global bio-fuel Alliance, Mission LiFE or Ek Ped Maa ke Naam [Plant for Mother] campaign. He further added that this inclusive approach has also led India to be the first responder when natural disasters have struck various parts of the world – be it a cyclone in Sri Lanka, earthquake in Afghanistan, floods in Mozambique or hurricane in Jamaica.

4. Speaking about India's inclusive and sustainable growth, Prime Minister elaborated that its mantra of "Sarv Jan Hitaye, Sarv Jan Sukhaye" [welfare and happiness for all], had led to appreciable results in fostering financial inclusion, health security, digital identity, technology-led empowerment of people and women-led development.

5. Prime Minister noted that international partnerships should move beyond the donor-recipient paradigm to one of solidarity and equal ownership. He also stated that lack of respect for international law was

the biggest hurdle to building international solidarity, and needed to be addressed as a priority. He emphasized that for international partnerships needed to prioritize dialogue and diplomacy for ensuring peace and stability. The full remarks of Prime Minister may be seen here [\[link\]](#).
